

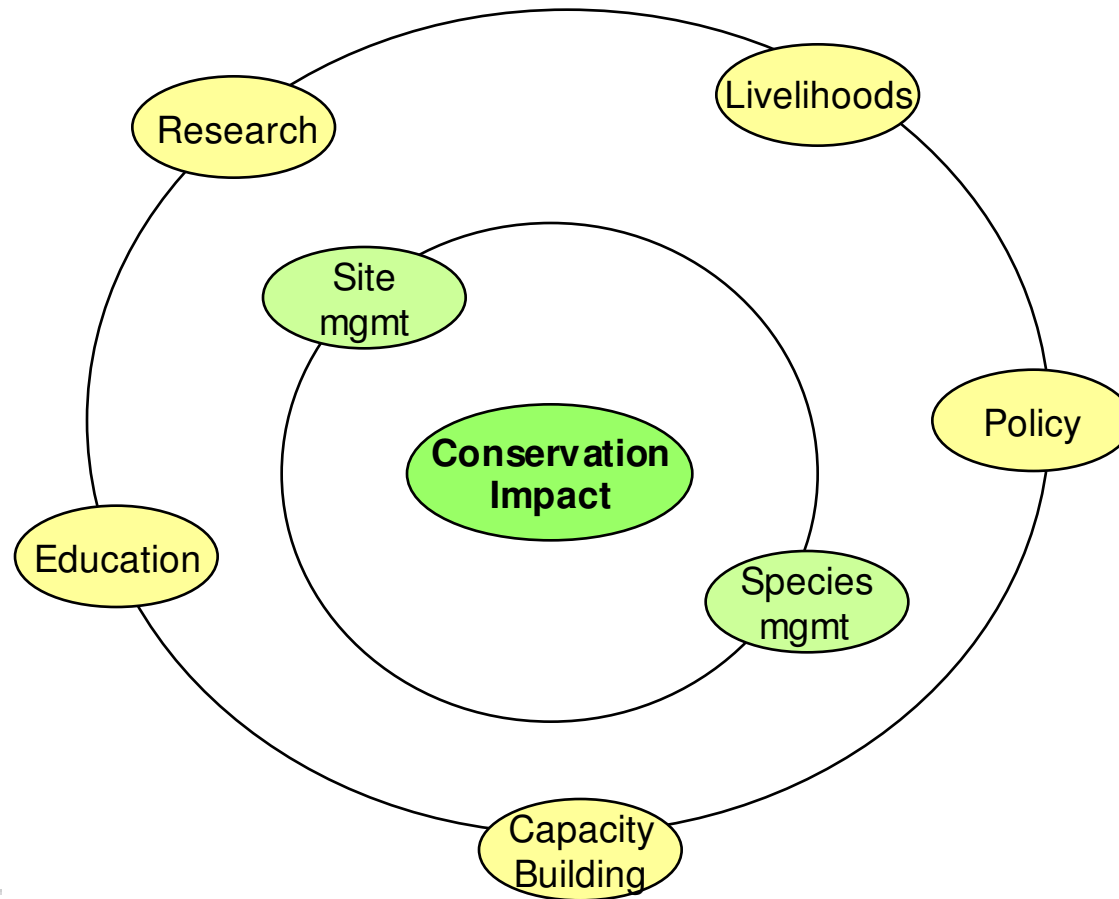

Why are conservation organisations interested in measuring livelihoods impacts?

- Performance can be monitored at several levels:
 - **Input** - have you spent the money?
 - **Activity** - what did you do with it?
 - **Output** - what did it get you?
 - **Outcome** - what effect has it had on the problem?
 - **Impact** - what is happening to the ecosystems/habitats/species/populations



What are the main challenges in measuring livelihoods impacts?

- We don't know how to
- We don't know what livelihoods are
- We don't know what for
- Lack of time and resources
- Not planned
- Quantitative indicators are too simplistic
- Qualitative information is too complex
- It still takes time to see measurable changes
- Difficult to determine causality
